

Online vs. In-Person

I have invented a law. Johnston's First Law of Emails. It's a law that is relevant to all clergy. It goes like this: *The number of emails a pastor receives about a topic is around 5% of the number of parishioners who are thinking about it.* Johnston's Law goes on to advise how clergy should respond to such emails, using this formula:

- 1 email received: Just drop a quick reply to the person, reassuring them that everything is OK.
- 2 emails received: This topic was covered on MSNBC or Fox News.
- 3 emails received: The pastor should really think about making a statement, summarizing his/her views on the topic.
- 4 emails received: This is a debate of national importance, and the pastor must urgently issue a long and authoritative treatise before people storm the church with pitchforks.

As we've emerged from the pandemic, there is one topic that is off-the-charts for emails to clergy. Here it is: **Now that we are back in-person, should we drop streaming church services?** I love this question because, for a change, I think I know the answer. So I rush to answer it.

First, let's stake out the common ground. There's a piece of land that we can all agree on. Nothing can take the place of Christian community. The gold-standard is when we all come together (as much as we are able to) to worship and celebrate our connection in Christ with each other, as Christ's family who belong to St John's, Alabama. This is especially important as nowadays there are few places where people choose to hang out with folks who are not like them. Church is the opportunity to encounter diversity, and to learn, grow, and love.

So, if you are often out-of-town on weekends, try extra hard to re-engage with St John's in-person on those Sundays when you are able to attend.

But (and didn't you just know there was a 'but' coming?) there's a lot more to be said than that..

- 1. **I believe there is still an absolute need to stream digital services.** These services have become vital not just to folks who are sheltering from Covid, but to faithful church members who can't be in church for other very valid reasons. Streaming services empowers infirm and homebound parishioners to view a real worship service (albeit on TV) occurring in the building they love, seeing their friends walking up for communion, listening to the music, and hearing the preacher. At St John's we have a wonderful ministry of Lay Eucharistic Visitors to go to the homes of such folk, but this is no substitute for entering fully into the worship of their church. Can I really say to housebound parishioners, "I'm glad you enjoyed taking part in the services on your TV, but now we're going to stop that"? Doesn't this, actually, hint at the exclusion of elderly, homebound, or disabled people? **Once we've given them this gift, why would we take it away?**
- 2. We stream services not just to provide worship opportunities for regular churchgoers who couldn't make it to the building, but as an act of evangelism for those who will not come. Through our streams we reach folk who do not go to church. Some of them, in time, might be persuaded to attend in person. But even if they don't, they are still hearing the Gospel, enjoying some Christian music, and experiencing something of God. Can we really now pull the plug on these folks, knowing it is possibly the only explicitly Christian input in their lives?

So, if you are often out-of-town on weekends, please make it a priority to stream St John's 10:30 service either live or 'on-demand'. Make every effort to remain connected with the people and with what God is saying to the parish.

The pandemic gave us a kick that we needed to exploit technology as a vital way of communicating and worshiping in the future. We understandably despair over the growing phenomenon of secularization. We complain about competing activities taking away our young families, and we lament the absence of people who are working, cycling, or at the lake on Sunday morning. But the Church's task has always been to adapt our methods of communication so that people still hear our message, despite what else is going on in their lives. We have people who watch recorded services on Wednesday afternoons because they were out of town on Sunday. We must continue digital - and increase it.

One of the great hallmarks of Anglican practice is the adage of 'both and', rather than excluding options and people. **'BOTH inperson AND streaming' gives us the maximum opportunity to reach folks - faithful people who can't be in church, as well as people who aren't yet Christians.** Yes, streaming cannot and never will replace in-person, but why do we have to choose one form and reject the other? We don't. We can't. We won't.

PS. In the New Year I will be forming a team of parishioners to dream about how we can use new technologies to expand the mission and ministry of St John's. If you have some expertise or interest in this topic, please let me know.

Below are the highlights: month of November 2022

- Our November 13, 2022, "Poppy Sunday" (known as "Remembrance Sunday" in England) was beautiful and healing. Expect to see an article about it in the December issue of *BOOM! Magazine*. It is our plan to make Poppy Sunday a St. John's tradition.
- We can see the light at the end of the tunnel for our windows project. The entire windows project is expected to be complete no later than February 2023, so we can remove all the scaffolding.
- Multiple groups have already requested and received tours of the Stained Glass Windows of St. John's.
- We have had multiple requests to clean and restore the two large Peter Paul Rubens reproduction paintings in the Nave. The Vestry has authorized a review of the cost and logistics of this potential project.
- In the wake of the tragedy at St. Stephens Episcopal Church on June 16, 2022, the Diocese of Alabama has made some security suggestions for Alabama Episcopal churches. We are working through those suggestions.
- Stewardship is coming along. A heartfelt thanks to all of our fellow parishioners who have pledged so generously for our needs in 2023. We have been moved by the commitment of first-time pledgers, and are so grateful for their investment in the mission of St John's. The Vestry has split up the names for those members who we think will make a pledge, but who have not yet done so.
- William Haynes has been compiling our long-term needs plan for upcoming repairs to our building and grounds. The issue with our heating system has been resolved.
- As we approach the end of the calendar year, we encourage those who have pledged for 2022 to send in the balance of their pledge obligation so we can have a financially strong 2022 year-end.
