


If you have not turned in your 2023 stewardship pledge, please do so as soon as possible. We cannot budget for 2023 until all pledge cards are in.

#### God Is a Shoving Leopard

If only all Anglican clergy were as memorable as the Rev William Spooner. Very few people have a linguistic feature named after them, but old Spooner is one of them. He lived in the 19<sup>th</sup> century and was a teacher and chaplain at Oxford University. But what made him famous, and what he gave his name to, were 'Spoonerisms' – those humorous slips of the tongue where the speaker mixes up the beginning sounds of two words in the same phrase.

Apparently, he uttered the words in this headline during a sermon, when meaning to say, "God is a loving shepherd." He also famously said:

- "It is kisstomary to cuss the bride" (instead of 'customary to kiss the bride')
- "I am tired of addressing beery wenches" ('weary benches')
- "You have hissed all my mystery lectures, and were caught fighting a liar in the quad." (You have missed all my history lectures and were caught lighting a fire in the quad'.)

"You have tasted two worms" to a student who had wasted two terms.

Personally, I look on old Spooner with admiration, even envy. It's now 150 years since he preached on God as a shoving leopard, but people are still talking (and writing) about it. I am pretty certain no one will be writing about anything I preach in 150 years. "Is it better to be remembered for making mistakes or not being remembered at all?" I ask myself this question and I admit to not knowing the answer.

It makes me wonder what would happen if we took old Spooner's sermon literally. How would the world be different if God were, indeed, a shoving leopard and not a loving shepherd? Well, it would certainly make life interesting for the flock. The leopard may lie with the lamb, but the lamb won't get a very good night's sleep.

Actually, I think I might like God to be my shoving leopard. No one will mess with you if you have a leopard walking with you everywhere you go. You see, one of my favorite vices, perhaps the one I'm most naturally gifted at, is cowardice. If you have ever done the Enneagram, then when I tell you I'm a Type 6 you will know what I mean. I need security, and my initial response to many situations is to imagine what could go wrong. Sometimes this is so debilitating that I fail to do the good things I know I should do. (By the way, if you haven't done the Enneagram, you really need to.)

So, having a leopard next to me, shoving me to step out in courage and faith would be very useful. For example, I'd know God was calling me to have a hard conversation, I'd naturally chicken out, but then the leopard would fix its orange eyes on me, give a menacing little growl, and shove me into doing the right thing. Often, I need more than a prod – I need a leopard to shove me.

Of course, the voice of the Holy Spirit is quieter than a leopard's growl, and gentler than its shove. God has impeccable manners, and never shoves anyone. Instead, I need to find my resources by listening and responding to the still small voice that whispers into my heart. God does give courage to us when we need to step out in faith and do something risky. But it is more of a loving invitation than a growling shove. Thank God for loving shepherds and shoving leopards.

#### Something Precious was Given

After the 10:30 service, photographs will be taken of our veterans and cadets who are open to having their photograph on the St. John's and Diocese of Alabama websites. #### **WARDENS' REPORT**

Duncan Johnston's Installation on October 12, 2022, marked the one-month anniversary of his and Gelind Johnston's arrival at St. John's. A review of the weekly average Sunday service attendance numbers for this month shows a very significant increase over the same period last year. Stewardship pledges for 2023 are going very well, but we want to encourage all our parishioners to make a pledge. It is a marker of a healthy parish to increase the number of pledges, even if the new pledges start small. Pledging is a way to deepen your connection with St. John's and to participate personally in our parish ministry. All pledges are greatly appreciated.

The Vestry approved the \$130,000 in grants recommended by our Outreach Committee. This committee is led by Charlie Harris. This is hard work indeed. There are many worthy local charities, and this committee has consistently done fine work to make our grants benefit appropriate local charities that have a connection to St. John's.


On November 13, 2022, we will be having "Poppy Sunday" in remembrance of Veteran's Day. Your Vestry, along with the Hansen Gallery, will be installing hundreds of ceramic poppies in the Labyrinth Garden. There will be a liturgy of remembrance and healing at 10:15 on Poppy Sunday. All St. John's veterans, cadets and prior military service members are encouraged to go to the Labyrinth after the November 13, 2022, 10:30 service for prayers and photographs. A local lifestyle magazine will be publishing a story about this important event.

Your intrepid Treasurer, Richard Bradford, is working with the St. John's Finance and Administration Committee (led by William Haynes) to come up with a long-range plan for the future needs of our campus.
